Rules Change Proposals

Of the nine rules change proposals for the current cycle, one has been approved for further consideration. It is CLNC22-7, and it would allow muffler pressure to be used in the Profile Navy Carrier event (321). You can review it at: Rules Proposals | Academy of Model Aeronautics (modelaircraft.org). There were no Cross proposals. You should express your opinions no later than 1 September if you want them to be considered by the CL Navy Carrier Contest Board (CLNCCB). The final voting will take place on 15 September, and any changes in the rules will be effective on 1 January 2022. Send your comments to your CLNCCB representative or to Chairman Dick Perry (tailhooker@comcast.net) and he will distribute them to the CLNCCB.

Memory Lane -- 1960 Dick Perry

I been having fun earlier this summer looking through a catalogue from America's Hobby Center, a mail order and large walk-in hobby shop in New York City It's been decades since I saw an ad for AHC in the modeling publications. The catalogue is dated 1960, about the time I was getting serious in modeling and thinking about competing. The prices are amazingly low, but I was working for a dollar an hour back then, so it's all relative! A Sterling Ringmaster, Yak-9 or P-51 could be had for \$3.50. The combat wings were often under \$3.00. The Top Flight Streak was top-of-the-line at \$3.95. The good kits were made in the USA by names you might remember: Berkeley, Stanzel, Demeco, DeBolt, Scientific, Consolidated, P.D.Q., Veco, Top Flite, Comet (they once made large CL models), Midwest, J. Roberts (the Mauler was \$5.95), Goldberg, Harters, Jetco, Scientific, A. J. Aircraft. They're all gone, along with some names even I don't remember: Monarch, Darwin, Enterprise, Cavacraft, Amcraft, Henry Engineering (acquired by Veco, I believe). The Scientific 1/2A models that many of us started on were \$1.50 for the profiles and about \$2.50 for the logs.

Engine manufacturers that have passed into oblivion are Atwood, Holland, Cameron, OK, O&R, Forster, Veco, Johnson, Wen Mac. Many won't be missed, but their products were cheap enough to get us started. Others were darn good engines at the time. The .35 engines that interested me were all right around \$15.95 – the price I paid for my first "serious" engine, a Supertigre 35. At \$75.00, there weren't many Dooling .61s flying around the Carrier circles -- not with the McCoy 60 available at \$40.00!

I think the next model I start will be for the Nostalgia Profile event. My Supertigre and K&B 35s haven't been on an airplane for quite a while! I had hoped to get one going by the Fargo contest at the end of August, but that won't happen, I'm afraid.

Using the AMA's Contest Finder has some severe limitations, and it is not intuitive. If you want to look for CLNC contests, you can do that, but you won't find anything but Carrier-only contests or contests in which the CD asked the contest to be categorized as CL Navy Carrier. That's not likely since nearly all CL contests have multiple categories of competition. The AMA site is misleading, in that regard. The best way to use it is to search "Control Line All" as you have a better chance of finding a contest with Carrier included. Unfortunately, you must look through each listing to find if CLNC events are offered. Fall Postal Contest
